Do not use footnotes. *IISE Transactions* uses a double-blind review process. Please make sure that you submit the **blind version** of your manuscript, which does not contain any information identifying the authors. This includes removing the authors information on the title page as well as the information that may be identifying in the Acknowledgment section. We thank you for your attention to these details.
